came, went), $\lambda \acute{\epsilon} \gamma \omega$ --> $\epsilon \idelta \pi$ ov (I said), $\acute{\epsilon} \rho \acute{\epsilon} \omega$ --> $\epsilon \idelta \delta$ ov (I saw). You need to know that these forms are the aorist tense forms, and what their lexical forms are. Otherwise, you won't be able to parse and, more importantly, you won't be able to look these up in the lexicon to get answers to questions you have about the word's usage and forms.]
